Code No. 402.2R1 CHILD ABUSE REPORTING REGULATION

Iowa law requires licensed employees to report to the Iowa Department of Human Services (DHS) instances of suspected child abuse which they become aware of within the scope of their professional practice.

The law further specifies that a licensed employeewho knowingly or willfully fails to report a suspected case of child abuse is guilty of a simplemisdemeanor and that the licensed employee maybe subject to civil liability for damages caused bythe failure to report.

Employees participating in good faith in the making of a report or in a judicial proceeding thatmay result from the report, are immune from liability.

Child Abuse Defined

- medical treatment for a child forthat reason alone shall not be considered abusing the child
- 4. The acts or omissions of a personresponsible for the care of a child which allow, permit or encourage the child to engage in acts prohibited pursuant to Iowa Code, section 725.1 whichdeals with prostitution.

Teachers in public schools are not "persons responsible for the care of the child" under this definition. However, a teacher who abuses a childis subject to civil, criminal, and professional sanctions.

"Child abuse" is defined as:

3.

- 1. Any nonaccidental physical injury, or injury which is at variance with the history given of it, suffered by achild as the result of the acts or omissions of a person responsible for the care of the child.
- 2. The commission of a sexual offensewith or to a child . . . as a result of the acts or omissions of the personresponsible for the child. Sexual offense includes sexual abuse,incest, and sexual exploitation of a minor.

The failure on the part of a

family of the child. The DHS is responsible for investigating the incident of alleged abuse.

Reporting Procedures

Licensed employees, including teachers and schoolnurses, are required to report, either orally or in writing, within twenty-four hours to the Iowa Department of Human Services (DHS) when the employee reasonably believes a child has suffered from abuse within the scope of employment.

Within forty-eight hours of an oral report, awritten report must be filed with DHS.

Each report should contain as much of the following information as can be obtained within the time limit. However, the law specifies a reportwill be considered valid even if it does not containal of the following information:

- 1. name, age, and home address of the child;
- 2. name and home address of theparents, guardians or other persons believed to be responsible for the care of the child;
- 3. the child's present whereabouts ifnot the same as the parent's or other person's home address;
- 4. description of injuries, including evidence of previous injuries;
- 5. name, age, and condition of otherchildren in the same home;
- 6. any other information consideredhelpful; and,
- 7. name and address of the personmaking the report.

Board policy states it is not the responsibility of employees to prove that a child has been abused orneglected. Employees should not take it upon
